LICENCED AND AUTHORISED MINISTRIES

We are very fortunate to have a diverse team of ministers, these include, ALM's, LLM's and Clergy. Each of these ministries are supported and trained by the Church to enable and support its work, ministry and mission and in church and society. Supported by the diocese, we believe that a shared ministry of ordained and lay people develops a healthy Church and a world-facing discipleship.

This article aims to do two things, inform us on the different ministries that are part of who we are and to encourage you to think about whether God is calling you to one of them, or do you see particular gifts in others and wish to encourage them to explore it further.

Authorised Lay Ministers (ALM's)

Lay ministry is thriving in many ways, and Authorised Lay Ministry affirms this. Many people want to offer their time and talents in particular ways, and this scheme offers them a short but focussed diocesan training course, to equip them for specific roles in their parishes.

The primary responsibility for selecting, authorising, supervising, and supporting authorised lay ministers lies with the parish priest. Names are put forward to the PCC who agree on that person continuing to training.

All ALM's are selected following the current diocesan safer recruitment process. This includes an expectation that the candidate will do the appropriate level of safeguarding training (currently Basic and Leadership).

There are several pathways within the ALM's training:

- Children's and Youth Worker
- Evangelist
- Pastoral Worker
- Worship Leader

Authorisation is done in your local church by your parish priest.

Our current ALM ministers are: Mick Fletcher, Graham Clark, Helena Allen, Sarah Linton and Sue Sperring.

Licensed Lay Ministers (LLM's)

Licensed Lay Ministers (also known as Readers) are part of the nationally recognised and accredited public ministry of the Church of England. It is a voluntary, unpaid ministry with approximately 10,000 Licensed Lay Ministers nationally and around 160 in Worcester diocese. The minimum age for training is 16.

LLM's are trained in theology, pastoral work, and a variety of ministerial skills, and one of their key roles is to help people think with clarity and imagination about God's presence and activity in the world. For this reason Licensed Lay Ministers are sometimes described as 'lay theologians' because they help the church 'do theology' – in other words they help people connect faith and life.

The heart of the role is a ministry of the word: that is a ministry of teaching, preaching and leading worship. However, according to their gifts, Licensed Lay Ministers are also engaged in a wide variety of other ministries, such as pastoral work, funeral ministry, chaplaincy work and community involvement.

Whatever their work they seek to minister in partnership with lay and ordained colleagues, and to encourage other people's gifts. They are part of a team of ministers working under the authority of an incumbent (parish priest).

For Licensed Lay Ministry, there is a period of exploration when you work with others on discerning your calling. This is done with diocesan appointed Wardens of Readers and involves a selection process. If selected, training for Reader ministry takes place in partnership with the Queen's Foundation, Birmingham.

The course is followed over two years, with weekly meetings following the timetable of the school term, and holidays in between. At some point between the beginning of May in your first year, and the end of July, you will complete a short placement in a church which is in a significantly different context to your own. Most of the training is done in 7 week modules, on one evening a week. For two of those weeks, usually the first and fourth, training is onsite at Queen's, the other five weeks are delivered over Zoom. In each year, one module is delivered over three Saturdays, one each term, based at Holland House Retreat House near Evesham.

Our current LLM ministers are: Sue Wardle-Phillips and Helen Ayling.

Ordained Ministry

Some people, though, find themselves increasingly feeling themselves called to take a particular responsibility of God's Church by becoming ordained ministers. This is a very public ministry: ordained men and women are very often the 'public' face of the Church that we see.

Such a calling needs testing. It isn't enough to believe yourself to be called by God to be ordained. The Church takes time to discern with you whether this is, indeed, your particular vocation.

Those who will try to help you discern whether you have a vocation to ordained ministry will want to be able to answer two fundamental questions:

- Is this person called by God to ordained ministry?
- Do they have the necessary gifts to undertake such ministry?

Ordained ministry is discerned wider than the parish, it probably begins with a time of discerned with the parish priest who then recommends them to the diocese to begin a more formal discernment process. As this progresses it includes a national panel of advisors too.

In 2022 Worcester Diocese trialled a new 'Auxiliary Pathway' to ordination. This was for people who felt called to local ministry in the parishes they are already part of. It means that they are not widely deployable but stay as local context ministers. Training on this pathway is not via a theological college route but in diocese training instead. Revd Martin Allen was in the first cohort of ordained minister's on this pathway.

The auxiliary pathway is an example of how training for ordination offers several pathways to explore as part of the discernment process.

Our Ordained minister's are: Revd Gail Rogers (Vicar) and Revd Martin Allen (Assistant Curate)

Other Ministries

There are lots of other ministries within the church too, all with varying degrees of responsibility. These range from writing and leading prayers or reading the bible reading during a service, Eucharistic Minister, chalice assistants, sacristan, hospitality and welcome. The roles with this section of other ministries have no minimum age requirement either so they are open to all.

Exploring Ministry

Do you feel called to any of these ministries, or recognise these gifts in someone else? Is there another ministry not mention here that you would like to chat about?

SPONSOR A PIPE ON OUR ORGAN

In 1971 the church organ was rebuilt by Thomas Sheffield of Solihull and placed on a free standing gallery in the north aisle. This



instrument replaced an earlier one built by the Hill Organ Company at the beginning of the twentieth century. The present organ has 1,348 pipes of which 180 came from the old instrument.

As part of our campaign to raise money for essential works and upgrade our organ we are launching, 'Sponsor a pipe!'

We have 1,348 pipes all waiting to be sponsored. Displayed in church we have a Sponsor a Pipe chart waiting to be filled with names. These names will then be remembered as part of the refurbishbent and upgrade as part of the history of the organ. Each month we will print in Grapevine names added during the previous month.

You can sponsor a pipe in your own name, in remembrance of a loved one, or why not even gift a pipe to someone, we can even print off a certificate if you wish to give to them.

Unsung Hero Award

At the Parish Council Meeting on Monday 8th April, alongside four other local people, Michael Davenport was recognised as an 'Unsung Hero'. Michael was nominated for the award for his care and support to individuals and groups in the parish and beyond.

Michael has been a long term member at St Laurence, he is a member of the choir and the bell-ringing team. For the last twelve months he has been one of our churchwardens too. But these are not the reason for his nomination.

Michael is a support to many, especially the older members of our congregation who were friends of his beloved parents before they died. Michael was central to bringing back The Ark Lunches, albeit in a different way to pre-covid, but it was his passion of bringing people together that sparked its return. Without Michael taking on the organisation, and doing most of the physical preparation they wouldn't be able to take place. He was also a key person in the organising of Christmas Day Community Lunch, again showing his commitment to the many people he supports, so they wouldn't be alone on Christmas Day.





It is only right that we here from some of the people that we supports.

'Michael is one of the most caring people I know. I couldn't do without him. He visits me, transports me to where I need to go, church, WI, Places of Welcome and the various other groups I attend. If Michael didn't do this, I would be isolated and lonely'

'Michael supports me in lots of ways, he helps me manage day to day activities. He picks me up. drops me off and then picks me up and drops me home too. He is good company, and I look to him as a friend'

'If it wasn't for Michael, I would be isolated. I wouldn't be able to get to the doctors or hospital appointments. He also transports me to social events even though he doesn't attend them himself.'

Unsung Hero Award

Alongside all of this, Michael volunteers weekly at Redditch Foodbank, and the Community Larder and he is a National Trust Volunteer too. In his spare time he is a member of the Barnt Green Choral Choir and Bromsgrove Choir, Church Choir and Bell-ringing. His role as churchwarden supporting Revd Gail is a quite a commitment too. Michael does all of these things because he is passionate about community, about people gathering together for social activities.

Michael, is feeling rather shy about this attention, but he really is deserving of this award, and we are thrilled that he has been recognised for the life-giving support he offers to many in the Alvechurch community.

Way back in 2009 when Rev David Martin asked me if I would consider becoming one of the two Churchwardens in St Laurence, I had little knowledge of what it entailed. He explained that it involved fundamentally three things. Firstly, working with the Vicar to coordinate the running of the church, secondly overseeing the care and maintenance of the church's buildings and ornaments, and thirdly making sure that church services proceed in an orderly fashion. Now, bearing in mind that at that time I was in full time employment, I thought, "That doesn't sound too onerous, and I could do a lot of it by phone while I was at work". So I said "Yes". And the rest, as they say, is history!

I've not had to throw any drunks or heretics out of a service; overseeing the care and maintenance is a straightforward procedural thing; and I've managed to survive working with three very different vicars!

What hadn't I anticipated was that I would still be doing the job 15 years later.

Churchwardens are elected each year and should not serve more than six successive years. But, of course, if the present holder of the role is reasonably competent and prepared to stand again, and there is on one else clamouring to take over, then it's human nature that the present holder gets re-elected. That seems to be what happened to me.

Most of the time I have enjoyed my time in the role and have certainly welcomed being able to serve the church community of St Laurence in this way. But now it is time to let someone else have a go. I shall be stepping down at the APCM in May. I've not found the role to be too onerous because I have had the support and backing of the congregation. Thank you all for your support, which I am sure you will continue to give to my successor.

Michael Davenport is St Laurence's other Churchwarden and Mark Linton and Andy Notley are Deputy Wardens. I am sure that I will be leaving the role in good hands.

Graham Clarke Churchwarden 2009- 2024

Graham has been a committed churchwarden for many years. I will miss working with him in this way. He has been a supportive colleague and friend, always checking in on how I am doing. I will miss our weekly cheeky banter at churchwarden meetings, but also his wise and questioning input to our discussions and planning.

I know you will still be around as part of the ministry team in your role as an ALM worship leader but, on behalf of the everyone at St Laurence and myself, we thank you Graham for your dedication to the role of churchwarden.


In mid-May Charlotte Palethorpe will be starting as our new Ark and Facilities Administrator.

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


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

Times when life changes are odd aren't they? There is an odd mix to them of looking back, thinking about now and wondering about the future.

We may look back with a mix of feelings -remembering what has been good and being grateful. We may also have regrets and wish that our lives had turned out differently. There is often a sense of anxiety, a questioning if things will be all right and what will the future bring? We may have that anxious feeling with us each day or when thinking about the future.

I have recently been going through another time of life with changes. After one substantial change to life with ordination as a Deacon in September 2023, I have now retired from my GP practice. Disconnecting and saying goodbye to folk has needed attention and careful planning. My colleagues have helped and supported amazingly well helping our clientele and me adjust. It has been humbling to receive thanks and good wishes for the future. There have been times of recalling shared experiences – some good some bad. I have been fortunate to "leave well" when for so many work has never been possible or leaving it has been damaging.

When we leave a team or a group and move on there can be a natural anxiety about how things will be without us. There can be a worry whether those we leave behind will cope or not. In the end the way to work that out is to do it and move on!

In this Easter season I am struck by how many times Jesus prepared the disciples for his leaving. My retiring is completely different to Jesus leaving through his death and resurrection. I now though understand a bit more about what he was doing. I relate to him preparing people to cope with the shocks they faced and the uncertainty of their futures.

He got them to try and live their lives in a unique way -His way.

He gave them more than wise sayings to live by -he gave them Himself

He left them feeling unsure what to do but gave them scaffolding. Scaffolding on which to graft their new lives.

What was that scaffolding like I hear you say? Well, he gave them a prayer -the Lord's Prayer to say and remember if they forgot everything else.

He gave them a new purpose to "go into all nations and baptise people" in His name.

He gave them a meal to remember him by which we call communion.

In his next life change he returned to Heaven and released the Holy Spirit as a friend and helper. Like the disciples that same Holy Spirit can help us today to be fully equipped and flexible to cope with life's changes.

I suspect the disciples wanted Jesus around longer to answer more of their questions. If though he had done that things might not have changed, and the church might not have been born. So, moving on can be a time of growth and change for us but also for those we leave. It certainly was for those disciples and the early church.

Whatever our feelings about past and future changes there is Good News. That is that our God who loves us is beside us every step of the way and that we have all the things outlined above available to us as we go through changes. With changes God helps us to adapt and cope. He does not expect us to change in ways we cannot bear and always seeks what is best for us through change. Why? Because He loves us as we are but wants us to be the best version of us, we can be.
