Rev Ruth Wilson, Minister of Rowney Green Shared Church and Chair of the Churches Together in Alvechurch and Rowney Green Group, writes..

I wonder if you have a favourite Christmas carol? Or maybe, like me, you have different favourites for different occasions. Before we left our home church in Coventry. to come into full time ministry, one of my favourite Advent activities was to go carolsinging in the streets around the church; as many as thirty singers wrapped up warm would sing heartily with the promise of mulled wine and festive treats at a host's house urging us on. It had been a church tradition for decades, and the singing was welcomed and looked forward to with warm smiles, and cheerful giving, by the households around and about, as we raised money for NCH Action for Children – you could feel the love. Often, we would get requests for a favourite carol: Away in a Manger, Ding Dong Merrily on High, Hark the Herald Angels Sing (trying hard not to pitch the opening notes too high!). Unfortunately, one of my favourites, wasn't often requested: Christina Rosetti's "Love came down at Christmas. love all lovely, love divine".

It's a great poem set to a good tune, but what does it mean? Love coming down at Christmas? Perhaps the love of Christmas is in the season of giving and receiving of presents, or is it in the hospitality of Christmas tables laden with festive food for all the family. Or maybe it's found in the warm fuzzy feeling the John Lewis advert evokes? (Other retailers are available!) Or is it the bounty of binge watching that's in store as we highlight the bumper edition of the Christmas TV listing magazines or, maybe it's the annual traditions , like the carol-singing from the lovely folk from a local church. I've listed lots of 'lovely' things which create warm feelings, but, of course, real love coming down at Christmas is much more.

Rosetti's carol offers us a less sentimental definition of that love. She manages to evoke the manger scene in Bethlehem without actually describing it and at the same time moves both beyond it and deeper into it. It sums up all that Christians understand about the meaning of the Christmas story, and it's also a statement of Christian belief. "Love all lovely, love divine" is a welcome whispered to a new born-baby and the revelation of the mystery of the love of God at work.

The season of Advent and Christmas is for retailers, the hospitality industry, and TV schedulers, a finite season, but, for the world, the message of love, hope, joy and peace must be a continuing season. Love might have come down at Christmas, but the message of Christmas is that that love must find a way of being present every day through us. God, wrapped in human form, a baby laid in the manger, is a moment in history, an important moment. It is the moment when God entered the world in Jesus, and in his life, ministry, death and resurrection, we find the love of God for us to model for us to be channels of love and peace in the world today.

> Love came down at Christmas, Love all lovely, love divine; love was born at Christmas star and angels gave the sign.

Worship we the Godhead, love incarnate, love divine; worship we our Jesus what shall be our sacred sign?

Love shall be our token, love be yours and love be mine; love to God and neighbour, love for prayer and gift and sign. *Christina G Rossetti (1830 - 1894)*

News from the Tower

The bells have been rather quiet this year because of Covid but we are at last being allowed to do a little ringing. The ringing chamber is a small space with no windows, so the advice has been that we restrict ourselves to fifteen minute sessions. Covid has also meant that we've had to stop training new ringers because of the social contact that that involves.



On the bright side, progress is being made with the plans to restore the tower. It's been ten years since we did a complete restoration on the bells but now the tower itself needs attention to make it structurally sound and to fix the leaking roof. Hopefully we'll be able to restore and regild the clock dials whilst the scaffolding is up. Something we were hoping to do ten years ago but access to the outside wall was too difficult.

We did a lot of fund-raising for the restoration of the bells and our next event will go towards the work on the tower. This will be our Table Top Sale on April 9th next year in the Ark. As usual, we'll have our own table of bric-a-brac and books and there will be individual tables available for anyone who can come and support us. Also bacon sandwiches, cakes and drinks. Once Christmas is over we'll start collecting things for our table so remember us when you're Spring Cleaning.

Christmas is, of course, the next big event and we'll be ringing as usual before the midnight service and on Christmas Day itself.

To end on a sad note, we lost one of our oldest ringers last month. John Hoccom started ringing in the early 90's and rang at St Laurence for 25 years. Even after he'd had to stop ringing he was a constant and reliable presence supporting our events. We will miss him and we send our condolences to his family. The bells will be muffled at his funeral as is traditional for a bell-ringer. The funeral is on Thursday 2nd December at 1pm at St Laurence church, then the cremation service at Redditch Crematorium at 2pm.



Archdeacon of Worcester, Robert Jones writes...





Let's hope we can celebrate Christmas more openly and at ease this year than last! Looking back over the past 18 months or so it is hard to believe how much we've had to put up with and how we've changed our behaviour in order to stay safe. I'm amazed how we have adapted our lives. Who would have thought that wearing masks in crowded places would become second nature? That a nationwide vaccination programme would have been so successfully developed? And that we'd all get used to administering lateral flow tests ourselves?

We have learned to manage public worship as safely as possible. We have celebrated funerals, weddings and family events in new and creative ways, though at some cost along the way. We have had to concentrate on the essentials. We have put ourselves out to look after ourselves and others with practical loving-kindness. Although we lost so much, it seems to me we have gained much as well. Perhaps, you could say, we put the heart back into human society.

Do you remember how last year's Christmas celebrations were much more muted than usual? People commented on how much they actually enjoyed the simplicity of pared down celebrations and an albeit enforced break with old routines. We had to re-think. We had to ask what really counted. We had to improvise - because we couldn't sing in church, we went outside to sing our carols. Strangely enough we took Christmas back to where it first began - not shut inside holy places, however beautiful, but outside in the world God so loved.

Mary and Joseph also had to improvise as they found a place for their son to be born. The heart of Christmas was born in the mucky manger of Bethlehem: even there, surely, their hearts sang for joy. The beating heart of Christmas was and is the Babe of Bethlehem, born for us.
