News footage of refugee camps, boats packed with desperate people, grief stricken faces of those mourning loved ones, images of children left hungry for food, shelter and love, makes painful watching. Exposure to large scale suffering raises difficult questions for those of us who are personally untouched by the political situation or natural disaster behind the stories depicted.

'How can I respond to this?' we ask ourselves often with a feeling of hopelessness. A trip into a large city brings us into contact with rough sleepers. What is our response? How can we walk by unmoved?

Some of us respond by giving a small amount of money, food or time to each needy person who presents themselves to us. Some of us direct our giving to towards selected charities or causes, and hope our gift eventually hits target. According to the Charities Aid Foundation (CAF) World Giving Index, 2015 British people are among the most generous in the world, measured by the amount of time, money or number occasions they have helped a stranger.

How we share our resources is a very personal thing. The Church of England suggests that regular churchgoers give 5% of net income to maintain and grow our mission and ministry, which includes maintaining buildings and providing an income for those whose work in the Church is their only source of income. Yet even then there never seems to be enough to go round. So you may wonder how St Laurence, your local church, addresses wider world need. Apart from what individuals may choose to

give directly, as a worshipping community we know we can't respond to every situation so we choose a small number of causes to which we aim to make a significant difference. We get involved in various ways informing ourselves of their current objectives and needs through personal involvement and then we give, of our time, of our prayers and by giving a proportion of our income.

Top of our list comes the Anglican Diocese of Peru with its schools, feeding programmes and youth work, then Montgomery Heights children's home in Zimbabwe, and then there are local charities. We try to make our involvement as personal as possible, so that we come to understand the particular need and are assured that our money goes directly to the area of concern. We know for example that it costs \$7,000 per year to enable a priest in Peru to keep his family (just now they are all men!) and release him from the need to earn an income whilst conducting his ministry over the wide geographical area and a vast range of needs. At Montgomery Heights we know the economic situation is constantly threatening the most basic supplies of food and medicine.

So this year we've decided that we'd like to supplement our personal and corporate giving by holding a **Mission Funday** where we can learn more about these projects, at the same time as having fun and sharing delicious food. The Sunday morning services on **30**<sup>th</sup> **October** will include a focus on Peru and Zimbabwe, and then from 3:00pm in the ARK there will activities, stalls and a traditional afternoon tea with an international flavour. Do come and join us.

# Youth Support Services celebrates 30 years

YSS is an independent charity which is very proud to be celebrating 30 years of providing mainly community based support services for people who are often vulnerable, have complex needs and who face difficult life challenges. Those supported include young carers (aged 7 -24), young people in custody (aged 10 -17) and adults coming out of prison.

YSS started in 1986 as a multi-agency project called ISS (Intensive Support Scheme) hosted under the umbrella of the Worcester Diocesan Board for Social Responsibility with a management board consisting of Social Services, Youth Services, Education, Probation, Police and local Magistrates. The name changed to YSS in 1994 and in 2000 YSS was registered as an independent charity and company limited by guarantee. They now reach over 2000 people a year across West Mercia & Warwickshire and have 50 staff and over 150 volunteers.

YSS is often described as being 'the glue' between people at risk of being socially isolated and wider mainstream society by delivering support services that are focused on achieving positive life outcomes. Staff and volunteers work mainly out in the community at times and places that suit the service users. They are passionate about what they do and will always go the extra mile to make a difference.








# **Gravedigger of the year**

The other day I met our gravedigger David Homer. I learned that this cheerful and helpful man has just received Gravedigger of the Year Award. I just had to share his story.

David Homer is 'made up' after being named as the UK's Gravedigger of the Year at the funeral industry's 'Oscars'. The Good Funeral Awards ceremony was attended by the leading lights of the undertaking profession, including those entrusted with laying Royals to rest. But it was the down-to-earth, former Able Seaman who received the biggest cheer of the day at the posh Porchester Hall venue.

David, from Measham in Leicestershire, began his working life as a miner digging coal before transferring his skills to graves. In between, he enjoyed a spell as a fireman and served on the Ark Royal and HMS Chatham. During his time in the Navy he saw active service in the Gulf War and Northern Ireland.

Being in a war situation shaped his deeply respectful attitude towards death. Outside work the Leicester City fan lives life to the full and

loves to clown around. But when he picks up his spade he is deadly serious about his business.

"I dig every grave by hand because I don't think it's right to have mini diggers disrupting the peace in churchyards. I think the reason I won this is because of the way I dress up graves. I have my own style and standards. It's not a hole – it's somebody's final resting place and it's got to be perfect for them", said David.

The organisers of the national awards describe grave digging as a 'Cinderella' type service: "No one sees the grave being dug and it's rare for anyone to stay and see it filled in. The unsung heroes who do this work take immense care to make a grave, which can have a very stark and frightening look, appear easier on the eye. What no one knows is that the best gravediggers make a connection with the people whose graves they dig. This work affects them. They never forget. And this is what inspires them to do the best job they can".

So next time you're in the Churchyard, keep your eyes open for the man with the spade and be ready to offer him your congratulations.

#### Hazel Hanks 23/12/24 - 25/08/16

Hazel was born on 23rd December 1924 in Moseley, Birmingham. She was the youngest of 3 children - Joan, Percy and Hazel. She attended an all girls grammar school in Moseley of which she was very proud, as she was very academic.

She moved to Snake Lane in Alvechurch when she left school and her fathers' job at the BSA was re-located to Redditch. She met her husband. John, when he was delivering the milk, as his family owned the local dairy in Meadow Lane. Their courtship flourished, and they spent many hours dancing in the village hall. John was in the Marines, and whilst he was away at war Hazel became involved with the Hanks family milk round, delivering milk on a horse drawn milk float to all the surrounding areas including Barnt Green, and Rowney Green. She had several other jobs prior to getting married, one of them being in the offices at the "Flexible" Manufacturing Company, located in Tanyard Lane.

Hazel and John married in St Laurence's in June 1945, and locals are reported to have said that it was the "prettiest" wedding they can remember. They moved into Red Lion Street after the wedding 71 years ago, sharing this large house with another local family, the Scanlons. As their family grew the Scanlons moved out leaving the Hanks family there until the present day.

Hazel and John went on to have a family of 9 children, 6 boys and 3 girls to which she gave her life, often juggling two jobs as well as keeping house and bringing up the children. Although it was a hard life they always had an annual holiday in North Wales and a hot meal on the table every day, even for any unexpected guests - the door was always "open". Other jobs included working nights at Blackwell Recovery Hospital, a local convalescent home, delivering meat for Crows the butchers, and working for Woolworths in Redditch on the sweet counter - though none of her children remembers her bringing any free samples home! After the death of John 23 years ago,

Hazel was happy to spend her time around her home and family: she was immensely proud of them all, and this included her 12 grandchildren and 9 great grandchildren.

Although she was a home-bird, she still liked the trips abroad, which she was still able to enjoy until fairly recently, but was always happy to return to the family home. Hazel's association with St Laurence's lasted over many years: her faith was important to her. At one time her family made up a large part of the choir. Hazel always had a good word to say about people. She was a very kind person. Hazel lived life to the full, and is going to be greatly missed by her family and friends, and all those who had the pleasure of knowing her. Her funeral was taken by Revd Richard Bubbers at St Laurence church followed by a committal service at Redditch Crematorium on 8th September.

Howard Graham Fowke, husband of Ruth and father of Carol, Howard and Graham, died on 12th August aged 76. Howard was a much loved person and a real family man.
