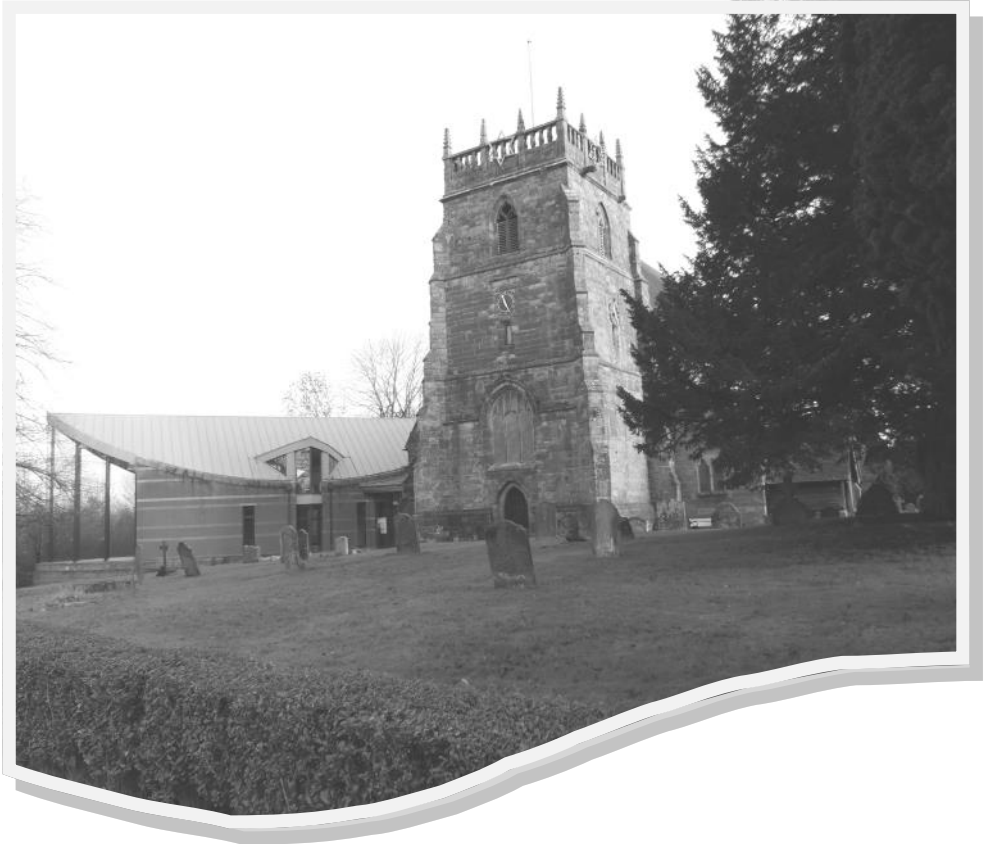

Falling Upward

Over the summer some of us at St Laurence's have been reading a book curiously entitled "Falling Upward": surely, if you fall, you fall **downward** – and not **upward**?

In his book, Richard Rohr describes the two halves of life, and how we move from one to the other through falling **upward**: in the first half of life, we are naturally and rightly preoccupied with establishing our identity – who we are – through climbing, achieving and performing. But those concerns will not serve us well as we grow older and begin to embark on a further journey, which involves challenges, mistakes, loss of control and suffering that shocks us out of our comfort zones.

Life, if we are honest about it, is made up of many failings and fallings, amidst all of our hopeful growing and achieving. Those failings and fallings must be there for a purpose, but what is that purpose? We can find it bewildering, but does it have to be? Is there a different and bigger way of seeing our lives, so that we can find a deeper and lasting meaning and purpose in the second half of life? In *Falling Upward*, Richard Rohr illuminates how we can come to an understanding of one of the most profound of life's mysteries: how our failing can be the foundation for our ongoing spiritual growth and finding inner fulfilment. Falling down can in fact become moving upward.

There are two major tasks for each human life: the first task is to build a strong "container" or identity, and the second task is to find the contents that the container is meant to hold. The first task we take for granted as the very purpose of life: establishing an identity, home, relationships, friends, community, security,

and building a proper platform in the world. This does not mean that we necessarily do it well, but because we are so focused on it, we may not even attempt the second task. We live in a "first-half-of-life" culture, largely concerned about surviving successfully, which encourages us to keep building a bigger and better container: this is not a good place to remain as we grow older, if we want to find lasting meaning and fulfilment in our life – to find the contents for the container of our life. These two halves of life are not necessarily linked to a person's chronological age: some young people, especially those who have learnt from early suffering, are already on the second journey/task of life, and some older people are still in the first stage of life and concerned with the building of the container of their lives.

The very things, the heartbreaks and disappointments, which can make the first half of life so hard and difficult, can actually be stepping stones to the spiritual joy and wonder that the second half of life has in store.

It can take much longer to discover the task of the second half of life, but when we begin to become aware and to seek it with honesty and integrity, we begin to move from the first to the second half of our own lives. This involves being honest about our motives and clarifying our intentions. Most often we do not pay attention to the inner task until we have had some kind of fall or failure in our outer tasks.

If you would like to find out more, and consider what the second stage of life is about, we are having a series of Sunday morning talks on *Falling Upward* at our 9.30 am family service and at our 11.15 am communion service on 4 September, 11 September, 18 September and 9 October, and you will be very welcome at any of these services.

Finding space to flourish

My social media feed has been filled over the summer with pictures from Christian conferences and youth camps. People meeting together for worship, pilgrimage, inspirational teaching and community building. Simon Hill, our Youth Officer, spoke on the radio about Spree, where many of our young people had a lot of fun, and I was moved by a picture of Justin Welby at Soul Survivor in the midst of thousands of teenagers praying fervently for him.

I had the privilege of a week in a tent on the Bath and West Showground at New Wine, where I was delivering a seminar, but mainly receiving input from others and mingling with wonderful Christian people with whom I shared coffee and wine, and learned much from as we chatted in queues and over barbecues. I came back refreshed and re-envisioned. There is something powerful about gathering with many others for celebration, worshipping our God in a way which is different from our weekly rhythm. God's people have always done it. Festivals of different kinds are woven through the Old Testament, and we see patterns emerging of annual pilgrimage, high days and holy days, significant seasons marked out as special in the Church through the ages.

It is healthy to have annual rhythms in our spiritual life which sustain and feed us. Autumn is always a busy time – a new term, perhaps new Alpha or Pilgrim courses beginning – the visit of the Archbishop of Canterbury this year for us being a particular focus. I have tried to prepare myself for this by spending time in August in retreat and refreshment, 'abiding' with Jesus, reading and allowing some space to grow. It's important to continue a sustainable routine into the busyness of autumn – short, regular periods of prayer and reflection perhaps or meeting with smaller groups of kingdom people week by week, to learn and pray together and encourage one another.

What are your spiritual refreshment patterns – annually, monthly, weekly? How, at the start of this new season, can you ensure they don't get crowded out?

In Matthew 11:28-30, The Message translation, Jesus says: *"Are you tired? Worn out? Burned out on religion? Come to me. Get away with me and you'll recover your life. I'll show you how to take a real rest. Walk with me and work with me —watch how I do it. Learn the unforced rhythms of grace."*

I pray we all, as kingdom people, will learn the unforced rhythms of grace in ways which sustain us, and enable us to flourish.

Would Jesus even notice you?

"On a Sabbath, Jesus was teaching in one of the synagogues, and a woman was there who had been crippled by a spirit for eighteen years" (Luke 13:10).

With the woman in the synagogue, it had been 18 long years of enduring pain. Then it came - the lens of God's love in Christ focused upon the anonymous figure at the back. This was her moment – with Jesus Christ!

Jesus had walked in – to be surrounded by the officials – but He's already seen the woman. Within minutes she will have the lens of God's love swivelling directly upon her. Four phrases summarise the actions of Jesus. *"He saw her....He called her....He said to her....He put his hands on her."*

She was never the same again. Instantly she was up, her face alight as she praised God for her release from the long agony - and the other worshippers were thrilled.

Not so, the synagogue ruler! For him, correct order and systems were more important than people. To him, healing on the Sabbath meant working on the Sabbath. *"There are six days for work!"* he complained. *"So come and be healed on those days, not on the Sabbath."*

Jesus immediately cut through the hypocrisy of the man-made rules that had fenced in the blessing of the One Day in Seven. He told a parable - of a tiny mustard seed that grew to become an all-embracing tree. This single healing was a pointer to the in-coming Kingdom of God - to that future day when Creation itself will be freed from all decay and corruption.

The lens of Christ's love moves through any gathering, touching one, reassuring another; lifting, forgiving, strengthening, ministering.

Someone asks, *'Can He meet with me too - among the millions of people who inhabit this world? Can He even notice me?'*

Go back to that Sabbath gathering of Luke 13, and see yourself there, as someone whom Christ loves, sees – and serves. Why, the lens of the Cross is on you. This is your moment - one in a million. That's you.

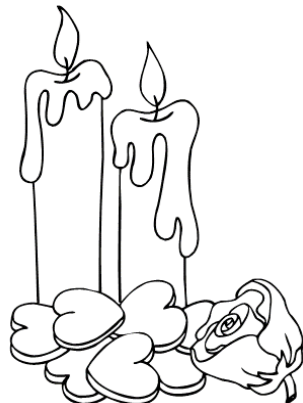

This one day Continuing Professional Development (CPD) event is for everyone who is interested in the current debates around mental health. It aims to attract psychologists, counsellors, psychotherapists, mental health support professionals as well as managers and individuals with a personal interest.

Facilitated by Dr Lucy Johnstone & Jo Watson and featuring spoken word artist Jasmine Gardosi It is a chance to discuss the critical questions of the day around the biomedical model in mental health.

Lucy Johnstone will summarise current debates and controversies about psychiatric diagnosis. It is increasingly acknowledged, even within the mental health establishment, that categories like 'schizophrenia', 'bipolar disorder' and 'personality disorder' lack validity. The false assumption that distress is best understood as disease can have very serious consequences for the individual, their identity, and their path to recovery.

The Way I See It : WHO ARE WE?

All this talk about Europe and the post-referendum arguments about identity have left me, and probably many people, wondering just who I am. After all, this island is home to people of probably the most mixed provenance in human history.

Way back, we were Celts, until our ancestors were driven back into the mountains of Scotland and Wales. Then came the Romans, the Vikings, Angles and Saxons, some to do a bit of pillaging and others to make themselves at home. Then came 1066 and the French invasion, which changed our language for ever.

Over the ensuing centuries we had various refugees from religious persecution, Irish people in huge numbers when harvests failed, and then more recently people from the Commonwealth, starting with the recruitment of workers from the Caribbean in the nineteen-fifties and then those driven from their homes by Idi Amin in East Africa. And so it has gone on.

Yet here we are, quite clearly a nation, even if we don't all look or sound alike. We may feel at times that it would be nice if everyone was just like we are, but deep down we know how boring that would be. It's a nice quiet afternoon exercise to map out our own answers to the question 'Who am I?' What are the things that really make me who I am? I've done my list. I am, I suppose, first and foremost Christian. Then I'm British (English/Welsh), European (geography/culture), and a member of the wonderful, multi-coloured, argumentative, richly endowed but endlessly flawed human race.

In the words of the old Church of England catechism, which older readers may remember, the answer to the question 'Who

are you?' is 'a child of God, and an inheritor of the kingdom of heaven'. Put it all together, and I'd settle for that.
