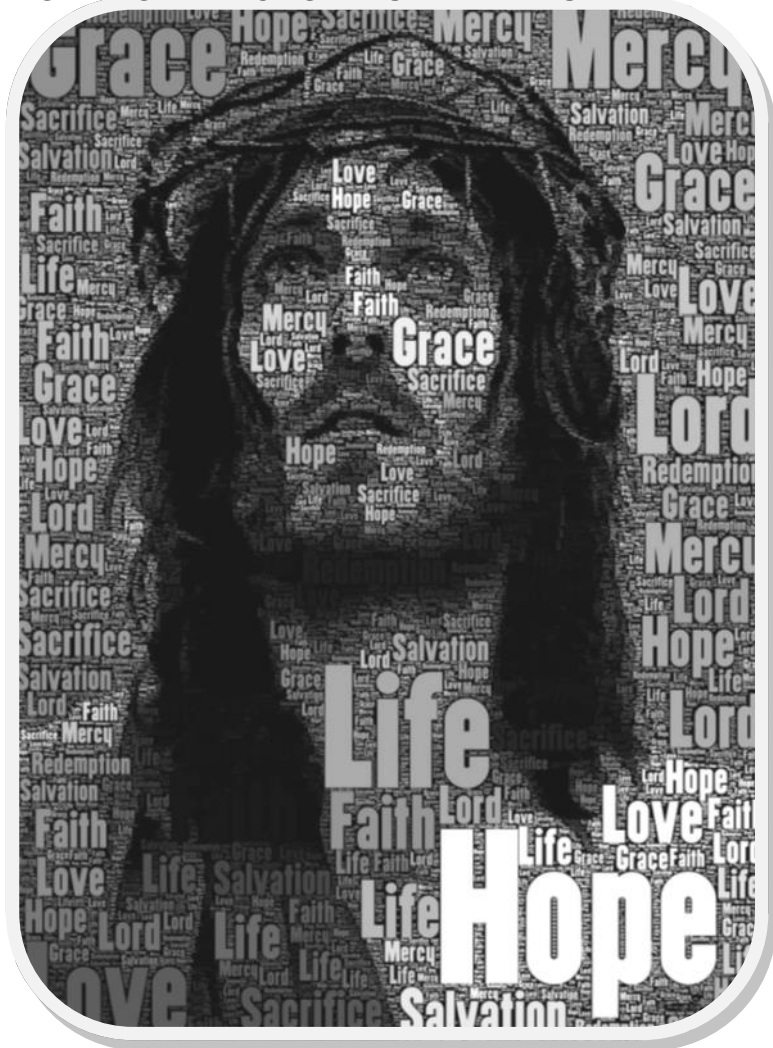

Revd Richard Bubbers writes...

Praying in a crisis?

At the time of writing, our country is in the grip of a national lockdown, and we do not know how long the effects of Covid-19 will go on for: I have just celebrated Easter in a most unusual way, without leaving my own home, and having previously participated remotely in 3 recorded services for the Easter weekend for viewing on YouTube through links on the homepage of our website (www.alvechurch-stlaurence.org).

A study has found that as the pandemic has spread, Google searches for the word "prayer" have boomed across 75 countries, in a way not seen since such data began: it has been found that the searches for "prayer" have doubled for every 80,000 new registered cases of Covid-19. The figures are flat until a country registers its first case of Covid-19, and then the number of searches rises drastically, regardless of where in the world the country is.

In Britain, online services from churches have generated virtual congregations which appear to be much bigger than the numbers of those previously attending in person. This indicates that many are seeking **help** in a time of crisis.

Jesus himself knew what it was to feel isolated and abandoned, when he cried out from the cross, "My God, my God why have you forsaken me?" (Matthew 27.46). In that moment of his greatest agony, he did not just knuckle under in despair or resignation, but cried out to God "in a loud voice" - he addressed the God who for him in that moment felt absent.

When we call out for help, we can discover surprisingly that we are drawn more powerfully to God through our anxieties and

weakness than we ever could have been through our successes and strengths alone. As Bill Wilson, who was the author of the Twelve Steps and the co-founder of Alcoholics Anonymous, realised, if we want to see true change in our lives, the starting point is to recognise our own "powerlessness". Anxiety about the future can descend like a fog on everything we see, but we can begin to see more clearly when we can acknowledge our own powerlessness and our need for **help**.

As the Christian writer Brian McLaren has said, when we are suffering from anxiety, we can begin by simply holding the word **help** before God, letting that one word bring some focus to our racing minds; and once we feel that our minds are less frantic and there is more of a sense of connection with God, we can let go of the general word **help** and in its place hold more specific words which name what we need: for example, we might hold the word **guidance** before God – or other requests such as **patience, courage, resilience, calm, wisdom, or peace**.

Along with our anxieties and hurts, we can also bring our disappointments to God. If anxieties focus on what **might** happen, and hurts focus on what **has** happened, disappointments focus on what has **not** happened. Simply acknowledging or naming our disappointment to God can be an important step, especially if otherwise we may be tempted to blame God for our disappointment, thus pushing ourselves even further away from our best hope of comfort and strength.

My prayer is that you will be more enabled to pray and bring your own requests to God during this unsettled time, whatever your own circumstances and experience may be.

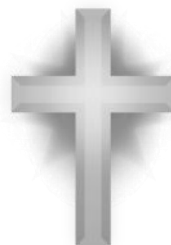

Workplace Chaplaincy – Offering care and concern for those at work

The week before Easter – Holy Week – I found myself visiting the main Control Room at Hindlip Park. This is the headquarters of both West Mercia Police and Hereford & Worcester Fire and Rescue Service, and I am their Lead Chaplain. An important part of my work is recruiting and supporting volunteers as local chaplains to specific stations – fire and police – across our region. We work as a team of chaplains – they in stations, and me at Headquarters. But the COVID-19 lockdown meant visiting stations was out of the question. To keep both services free of the virus all non-essential visits had to stop.

When the lockdown began – back on March 23rd – I had assumed I wouldn't be able to visit any of the places I normally visit as chaplain. There would be a risk of carrying the virus from one place to another and, anyhow, it was already clear, many of the workplaces we visit as chaplains had already closed for the duration.

As well as working with the Police and Fire Services 3 days a week, I also work, for the rest of the week, for Faith at Work in Worcestershire, the charity supported by all the main Christian Churches of the County, to support local congregations in providing chaplaincy to those at work. With 35 or so volunteers, from more than 20 congregations, our chaplains cover most towns in Worcestershire, including a small team in Alvechurch under the leadership of Revd Richard Bubbers, Rector at St. Laurence's. Virtually all visit people working in shops and, apart from food shops, all were soon to be closed.

But not before we had managed to pass out postcards, as part of operation 'Keeping in Touch' with a brief message of support and a contact phone number so that those not at work could contact their chaplain if they needed to talk. This is the essence of chaplaincy; to support people by listening, attentively and prayerfully. In this way, showing care and concern, they live out their Christian Faith – loving their neighbour - by getting to know people, learning about the pressures and stresses of their work, and being prepared to listen. A problem shared is a problem halved.

The lockdown presented workplace chaplains with a significant dilemma. Their instinct is to want to help; but just as people were facing real difficulties and uncertainties about their work, so chaplains could not visit, even if places where people worked were open. So how did I come to be in the Police and Fire Control Room? This is the place where any emergency call to Fire or Police gets answered (the West Midlands Ambulance Service has its own control room, with its own chaplain, in Dudley) and so is essential to the smooth running of the two services. Would there be enough staff to answer the phones, given that some would have to self-isolate? And people were anxious. The Control Centre is basically one huge room, about the size of 5 tennis courts, and manned 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. There are more than 440 people who work there, up to 90 at any one time; taking calls, mobilising officers and fire crews, following up crime reports. It is very hard to keep two metres distant, working up to 12 hour shifts.

I asked the Superintendent in charge about whether I should continue visiting. *'People are under pressure, and many are very anxious', he replied. 'They need someone who has the time to listen; to show concern and help them get through this.'* A supervisor put it neatly when she told me, *'you being here helps us stick to our job. Our work is essential, but so is yours'*.

And so I visit; and listen; and pray. To those who were frightened because a member of their family at home was vulnerable and they didn't want to take the virus home - torn between keeping their loved ones safe, and doing their duty. To those who, shift after shift, took calls from people trapped in their homes who were also frightened and needed reassurance; or who were in danger of becoming the victim of domestic violence as the enforced isolation pushed people together to beyond breaking point. To those who needed the chance to try to make sense of this new world of isolation and separation, of suspicion and the threat of sudden and serious illness.

And, at times like this, prayer seems to connect with all sorts of people for whom faith is normally not part of their lives. When one officer, having developed symptoms of COVID-19, was taken into hospital, people were upset, not just for the person themselves (they subsequently made a full recovery), but because there was nothing any of their colleagues could do. In response to this I produced a page of simple prayers, drawn from Christian, but also other faith traditions, and it was eagerly received. People look for hope, and healing and are grateful to be offered something. And that includes a visit from a chaplain, with the message that somebody does care, and they are not alone.

ALVECHURCH CARESsupporting each other in the Corona crisis

The spread of Coronavirus has affected every community in the country and has certainly had a big impact in our Parish. We do have a strong community here though and it's been no surprise that members of that community have come together to form a support network for those in need in Alvechurch and its surrounding villages. That process started over a month ago when our District Councillors, Kate van der Plank and Annette English, encouraged a group of residents to join them and form a support team. The Parish Council was asked to co-ordinate the initiative, as it already had a bank account, insurance cover for those working on Council business, and of course Parish Councillors able to devote time and enthusiasm.

As lockdown was starting in mid-March, the support team met using video-conferencing technology to formally set up Alvechurch Cares. The initial work was to identify and security-check a group of volunteers who would form the backbone of the initiative. Clear responsibilities were set out, risks were assessed, insurance arrangements confirmed and detailed logistics developed. Volunteers were trained and given lanyards and badges to identify them, a telephone Helpline was established and Alvechurch Cares went public with leaflets distributed round the Parish and The Village magazine publicising it all. There was a real desire that the initiative should look as professional as possible, supporting but not overlapping with the essential work of the NHS and local medical practitioners.

Progress in recent weeks has been promising. Over 150 people have signed up as volunteers and around 20 have so far been ID checked (early April). They are carrying out tasks for self-isolating and vulnerable residents who have no one else they can ask for help. The Alvechurch Cares support team supervises these volunteers and answer the telephone Helpline, currently handling around 8-10 calls a day. Many calls are from older or more vulnerable people, who are self-isolating, and can't

get to the shops or the pharmacy. Essential food items form most of the non-medical requests while picking up prescriptions is also a frequent need. Most pharmacy visits involve the free prescription service but those asking for food shopping are asked to pay by various means. The volunteers are trained to encourage bank card payments via a specially set up bank account where possible and there are also special arrangements for those who have difficulty paying for their shopping because of cash flow difficulties. This is why the Parish Council has helped set up the loan-fund account. Alvechurch Cares has also set up a telephone befriending service for those who are finding the lockdown situation and self-isolating quite stressful and would like to chat with a fellow villager.

The Alvechurch Cares team is having video conferences regularly to review progress and plan for the next few weeks. This is important when there is currently (early April) no prospect of the lockdown ending soon and normal life gradually returning. Like many similar community initiatives, Alvechurch Cares is guided by Government advice on CoVID-19 and that advice is being specifically interpreted for Parish Councils and community groups by our local County and District Councils. We're also collaborating closely with similar work being done by our neighbouring Parish Councils in Wythall and Beoley.

The success of Alvechurch Cares lies in helping as many in need as possible, balancing publicising of who's involved and who's benefitting, against the need for confidentiality. Put simply many volunteers and many of those in need would prefer to keep a low profile. The Alvechurch Cares message to everyone in our Parish is: if you, or someone you know, needs some basic help and support at the moment, and this isn't available from neighbours, friends and family, please get in touch.

A letter from the Bishop of Dudley

Strange times...

These are strange times. I'm the new Bishop of Dudley, and should be living in that area, but I'm writing this letter from under 'lockdown' in our old house in Oxford, unable to move.

It feels as though everything is disrupted and where nothing can be taken for granted. Our church buildings have been closed, and just when we want to gather together and encourage one another, we cannot.

We live in a world filled with fear, attacked by a virus we cannot cure. We can fear death and disease, poverty and unemployment; we can fear for loved ones isolated and far away. We can feel powerless and alone.

When Jesus was taken to be crucified most of his friends ran away, fearing for their lives, afraid that they would be next. But others stayed, mostly women like Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James and Salome. And then at the foot of the cross, James, the disciple whom Jesus loved, and Mary, Jesus' own mother. They must have been filled with grief and fear, but their love for Jesus was stronger still. Their love was stronger than their fear. They just had to be present with him.

I thank God for shopworkers, health workers, cleaners, carers, foodbank drivers and everyone else who set out to be present for others during this crisis. All those

whose love for humanity proves stronger than their fear.

This is the Easter season when we celebrate Jesus risen from the dead. The fear and isolation of Holy Week is past and a new age has begun. In these days between Easter and Pentecost we stand confidently in the warm sunlight of the resurrection, knowing that suffering and death will never have the last word; that God's love is real and unshakeable and in the end will prevail. The bible says, 'Underneath are the Everlasting Arms' and that is true for us as Christians, both in this life and, I believe, when we die.

As we move towards Pentecost we pray for the gift of the Holy Spirit to bless and inspire us for the road ahead. We pray 'Thy Kingdom Come' not with big gatherings and events this year, but online, in prayer, alone or in family groups. We pray for God's kingdom to come on earth as it already is in heaven. his is a kingdom of love, compassion, justice and freedom, where the people we all depend on in these days – health and care workers, shop staff, drivers and crop pickers, cleaners and refuse collectors and all the rest – will no longer be seen as menial or unskilled, but celebrated members of our society on whom we all depend. We need to find a new way of living in tune with the earth and creation, where global riches can be shared and where all can be fed.

I am living through the only global pandemic I have ever known. Its effects are tragic for some, and far reaching for us all. When all this is over we will need to build a better future. And that is something we can all be part of.
