Richard Bubbers writes.....

“What's so important about Easter?”

Unlike Christmas, Easter is not a festival fixed to a specific date in the calendar. It is a movable feast and its date each year is determined as being the first Sunday after the full moon that falls on or after the spring equinox. It can therefore occur at any time between 22 March and 25 April. In the Eastern Church, the dates differ because a different calendar is used. In modern times there have been various calls, particularly from schools, for a fixed date for Easter Sunday: recent discussions are focusing on the second or third Sunday in April.

In popular culture, there is not the same festivity or commercialisation at Easter as there is at Christmas. But the theme of new life (in the resurrection of Jesus Christ), linked with the emergence of spring after the *“death”* of winter, can still be seen in the gifts of flowers and the pictures of bunnies and chicks. The egg, with its tomb-like shape out of which a new life appears, has made it a widely recognised Easter symbol, and chocolate eggs can mark the end of a Lenten *“fast”*.

Easter is important because the resurrection of Jesus is at the heart of the gospel. As Paul says (in 1 Corinthians 15.14), *“if Christ has not been raised, then our proclamation has been in vain and your faith has been in vain.”* There is no description of the resurrection in the Gospels: what we have are accounts of events around the time soon after Jesus’ death through which the disciples came to believe that he was not dead but alive – not simply resuscitated but alive with a new life, resurrection life.

There is considerable agreement among the Gospels about those events: two basic pieces

of evidence for the resurrection are given, although they are presented in a variety of ways. The first is the empty tomb, and the other is the appearance of Jesus, alive again, to his followers on different occasions in different places. Both were necessary in order for there to be a credible basis for belief in the resurrection as the disciples came to understand it and believe in it. Without an empty tomb, Jesus remains a corpse. Without the appearances, his body might simply have been moved or stolen, as some people tried to allege.

For many, the most convincing evidence for the resurrection is the psychological change which occurred in Jesus’ disciples after the appearances. With the crucifixion of Jesus, they were completely demoralised, disillusioned and hopeless - all that they had believed in and hoped for about Jesus seemed to have come to an end. Something happened to cause a complete turnaround psychologically: they became prepared to go out and spend the rest of their lives spreading the good news of Jesus Christ – and even, if necessary, to give up their lives for him. It is improbable to believe that such men and women would have given their lives for someone in this way, if it was based on a resurrection story which they were not completely convinced was true.

Easter Day is a day of fulfilment of what was foretold in the Old Testament – and the start of new life. By his resurrection to new life, Jesus makes it possible for anyone who believes in him to have new life in relationship with God, which never comes to an end. *“God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life”* (John 3.16).

Without Easter day, there is no Christian faith – and no hope of new life.





Letter from the Archdeacon of Worcester

Robert Jones writes...

A friend was talking about another friend from his university days who he described as a 'heavy Christian'. I think he meant the rather intense believer who witnesses readily, but sometimes puts people off. It got me thinking about the ways in which I was or wasn't a 'heavy' Christian myself!

We sometimes make heavy weather of what we call Good News. It can feel as though it is all down to us rather than God. The truth is that we don't have to save the whole world, but simply play our small part in responding to God's love.

Prayer is all about noticing what God is doing. Anthony de Mello, a Jesuit, collected stories of faith, including this one: *'Master, is there anything I can do to make myself more enlightened?'* The master replies, *'Do as little as you can to make the sun rise in the morning.'* *'But master, of what use then are the spiritual exercises you prescribe?'* *'To make sure you are not asleep when the sun rises!'*

Our Christian traditions and disciplines – worship and prayer, study of scripture – are to make us more aware of God's presence in the world and to be more present ourselves.

Feeling good about ourselves and God does not need to be selfish. Many of the great social activists have been people who spent time in contemplative prayer and learned to notice what was happening - people who could see the wood for the trees, as we say.

Once you become attentive you notice more. So, for example, you notice that refugees aren't simply an issue to be dealt with but are families; people who are refugees. Or, the issue of homosexuality, with which the church struggles, is about people who are gay.

Karl Barth, a great Twentieth Century Swiss theologian, whose life spanned two world wars, said: *'To clasp the hands in prayer is the beginning of an uprising against the disorder of the world.'* Ours is a social gospel, and we all have our part to play. So often it starts from attentiveness, learning to be present.

Later this month we celebrate Holy Week and Easter, when Jesus enters the depths of what it means to be human. You might say it was a small event on the world stage: the press would probably have been stalking the corridors of power, rather than the municipal rubbish dump outside the city wall. But it was not just another crucifixion – it was the main event, along with what happened three days later, for those who had eyes to see. Let us learn to be attentive then, to make sure we are not asleep when the sun rises.



Alvechurch Historical Society

Hilary Taylor writes...

Our recent AGM, was followed by a slide & audio presentation on the Worcester - Birmingham canal, which runs through Alvechurch. John Hemingway, told us about the Worcester - Birmingham & Droitwich Canal Society, which has been active in the village since 1969. For many decades the canal was used to transport goods, such as coal, limestone, salt, bricks from Alvechurch and cocoa to Cadbury's in Bournville. By the mid 1960s it had been superseded by road transport, and there were moves to infill the waterway. Happily it was preserved, and now is busy with leisure boats, many of them traditional narrow boats. Negotiating the 30 lock flight (the longest in the country) at Tardebigge recreates a slower pace of life, along with the physical effort of working the lock gates.

It's time to start your spring cleaning. Turn out your cupboards, sheds and attics and let us get rid of some clutter for you. Talk to any of the ringers, phone Colin on 01527 64077 or email alvechurchbells@yahoo.co.uk All the money raised is going to the upkeep of the tower this year. We had the major restoration works a couple of years ago and this has left the ringing chamber in a bit of a mess. We're planning to have the walls repainted and to replace the offcuts on the floor with a proper carpet.

Ringling is also going well. We've got three new ringers, two beginners and a third who's already got some experience. You might have heard them on practice nights; instead of hearing all the bells going there's just a single bell ringing as one of the learners learns how to handle the rope. If you are very observant

you might also hear the rest of us coming to terms with Grandsire Doubles on six bells later in the evening.

Ringling the bells in the basic sequence of rounds (1-2-3-4-5-6) gets monotonous (for us and for the listener) and Grandsire brings a bit of variety. It's one of the oldest traditional methods and takes us through thirty different sequences, starting and finishing in rounds. Listen carefully on Tuesday and you may hear us; a few seconds of rounds to start with then a couple of minutes of different patterns until we end up neatly back in rounds again.

I will have a board on the table for signing which helps me if I know who can come along.
