

Finding the Good News

Fires in Australia, murders in British cities, war in Syria – sometimes it seems as if we only hear bad/sad news. What about the good news?

In no particular order : Renewable energy could well expand by 50% over the next 5 years, mountain gorilla numbers in Eastern Africa are growing, a church and a mosque in New York joined forces to spread good cheer this Christmas serving a meal and health screening to struggling neighbours. Also only 150 years ago almost no one had access to clean drinking water, now 87% of the world's population do; we're getting there!

I read recently a comment that most religions seem to spend a great deal of time fasting while Christians seem always to be feasting! An over simplification perhaps, as fasting does have a place in Christian worship and tradition, especially during Lent; but perhaps the main reason we spend so much time celebrating is because we are the receivers and givers of the good news, and it's worth celebrating.

It's the simplest good news in the world. God isn't a grumpy old man up in the sky sending thunderbolts and grumbling endlessly about the deterioration of modern manners and behaviour. He's... well, words fail me – extraordinary, phenomenal. When you let him into your life, the brightest moments become incandescent

with joy and the deepest, darkest times become safer and more bearable, because the person who loves and knows you best of all is right there with you, wanting to help.

Judgement is a frightening word and so often bandied around by those who seek to put God in a box marked 'rules'. Jesus was a consummate rule breaker. When he met people, he simply didn't care what they looked like or what they had done. He just looked straight through all the surface stuff we so often use to sum people up and dismiss them, and saw what could be. Oh the joy of meeting someone who just gets you. God gets us; he made us didn't he? He wants to get really close if only we could stop being so determined to push him away and do it all by ourselves. The truly good news is that he was willing to give everything to make sure that we could have that close relationship. So...Jesus came and he exemplifies the good news. His first miracle was to turn water into wine at a wedding. The time for celebration was here; light and joy had come into the world. Although he came to suffer and die, Jesus is the good news because he loved us too much, he chose to put himself through all the bad stuff so that we could be close to God, just as we are. We can bask in the joy and freedom of being enough for God. He, in Jesus, did the hard work of reconciliation. All God asks of us is that we accept that perfect, accepting, transforming love and reflect it to others, so that they will know that they are enough – they are welcome to join the feast – they don't even have to dress up.

News From The Tower

Geoff Franklin writes...

The bell ringers will be holding their annual Table Top Sale in the Ark on Saturday March 28th. All the usual attractions; jumble sale, lots of individual stalls, plenty of tea and cakes. Come and get your bargains. More details next month.

We're also starting our annual recruitment drive. We've got a good core of regular ringers at St Laurence but only nine of them and that doesn't leave much leeway for holidays, illness, and the like. Ringing isn't difficult but it's good exercise for mind and body. You don't need to be strong, you don't need to be musical, and you don't need to be a member of the church. If you're fit enough to climb the stairs to the ringing chamber and tall enough to reach the ropes then you qualify.

But what do you get out of it? When you start ringing you'll be getting an hour of gentle exercise every week and that's a good start to the New Year. Physically you'll be standing and stretching, mentally you'll be listening to the sound of the bells and making sure that you're ringing in the right place in the sequence. At its simplest that's a straightforward 1-2-3-4-5-6-7-8 but it becomes more interesting when we vary the order. You'll be part of a long history doing this. The unique sound of English Change Ringing goes back to the 17th Century.

Get in touch or just come up the tower on a Sunday morning or a Tuesday evening. All that we ask is that you don't walk in whilst we're actually ringing; it'll be noisy and we'll be too busy to talk to you. Wait a couple of minutes until we pause for a breather.







Dick Russell's Series of vignettes No 2

Settling in to Alvechurch in 1959. Once I had settled into my new 'digs', the first service I attended at St Laurence Church in Alvechurch was an 8 o'clock service of Holy Communion where I introduced myself to the rector, Patrick Blakiston. It was held in the Lady Chapel. There were no chairs up front as there are today, the foremost seating being the front pews. Occupying the end of that pew was a man who had entered carrying his bowler hat and attired in a pin-striped black suit. This gentleman, I learned was a Mr Higgins, known to his close friends as '*Bunny*' Higgins I believe, I later learned that he was Deputy Lord Lieutenant of the County of Worcestershire. He attended this service every Sunday, and was always the first person to the altar rail to receive communion, and the first to be out of the church at the end, and I never ever spoke to him nor he to me. I later that day attended Evensong, which was on that occasion led by the curate, an elderly, gentle, and very intelligent, man who had been a coalminer but worked his way from the coalface into a position of some authority at the mine and also in the NUM, and had made a study of communism in Russia under Stalin, He had been ordained to the clergy at a later age than usual at that time.

I was to discover that a number of people in the village thought he was the '*vicar*', and the newly appointed rector was his curate. His favourite task was ministering among the Rowney Green Mission Church congregation. This small building which had been built in Victorian times, but was well-equipped, as was a similar one in Hopwood, (and both had proper pipe-organs). The former was to be discovered along a path running from one side of the road leading to Lower Rowney Green, about one quarter of the way down, to the same road as it wended its way back again to the upper village. From late April to early May the church was surrounded with a carpet of bluebells in its peaceful sunny glade.

Both churches were decommissioned some time later. That at Rowney Green is now an attractive house, easily recognised for what it had been. I conducted Matins there twice a month, as a rule, once I had been licensed as a Lay Reader.

Planning for a funeral is an emotional experience especially for close family and friends. It involves many decisions at a time when much of our energy is already consumed with coping with the impact of the loss of a loved one. If the death is unexpected then the pressure is even greater. It matters that everything is done well. It matters that the wishes of the deceased are carried out, it matters that the diverse wishes of the family are taken into consideration, it matters that expectations of friends are to some degree fulfilled, because each person is on their own journey of grieving. The time needs to be convenient for loved ones to attend, the venue needs to be appropriate and the service, of whatever kind, needs to be conducted with dignity.

It's a big ask. Not everyone wants to turn to the church for help, but for those who do, what is it that they can expect? Without doubt our local parish church, St Laurence's, can provide a beautiful and tranquil environment. The liturgy of the Church of England funeral service is dignified with plenty of opportunity to make it personal, customising the service to include personal details of the deceased, their interests, passions and talents.

In the introduction to the Anglican Funeral Service five aims are listed: to remember and celebrate the life of the deceased; to give thanks to God for the gift of their life, to entrust them to God for eternity and commit their body to the ground (whether by burial or cremation), and that family and friends can come together to comfort one another in their grief.

In my experience there is also something else that many people are looking for. They want to end well. They are conscious of the finality of death and are often aware of unfinished business with the loved one who has died; ends that haven't been tied, words of love or forgiveness that have not been uttered during the lifetime of their loved one. The Christian faith is one where forgiving and being forgiven is a central theme and figures in regular worship

and I find forgiveness is a theme that often has a place in a funeral.

So, the funeral service aims to meet many needs. Music plays an important part whether in song, with traditional or modern hymns, reflective music played during the service or the important choice of music to accompany incoming and outgoing processions and to settle the congregation as they assemble. Memories of significant events and well-loved personal characteristics form an important part of the giving of tribute on behalf of or by a member of the family or close friend. There is the sharing of a favourite or well-loved passage of scripture and the sharing of prayers, both for the deceased and for those present.

If the deceased lived in the parish and expressed a wish to be buried in our churchyard, the funeral service ends with prayers at the graveside, if their wish has been for cremation the service ends at the crematorium with a brief ceremony of committal (often followed at a later date with an interment of ashes in the churchyard).

So how can you make sure you or your loved one has the type of funeral they hoped for? Step one is to talk about it with them well in advance and then if possible, record your/their wishes in a Will. Some people find it a subject that crops up naturally, but for others it's a difficult topic to raise, there are still taboos in talking about death. All I can say as someone who regularly takes funerals is that it is so helpful to those charged with organising a funeral to know the wishes of their loved one. Parting is painful and at times of loss people need help and assurance that they are reflecting their loved ones wishes in the decisions they make.

We at St Laurence's are here to help you when it comes to planning and leading a funeral, and offer spiritual support and care to members of our parish, whether or not you are a regular church goer.

Obituaries

June Border

25th March 1928 to 16th December 2019

June Marcia Border was born June Hanks on 25th March 1928, and died at home at the age of 91 on 16th December 2019.

Her funeral was held on Thursday 2nd January 2020 at St Laurence church. June is survived by her younger sister Diana, their younger brother Stephen having sadly died at the age of 18. Diana and June had beautiful voices and from about 13 years of age sang on the radio and performed at the Palace Theatre in Redditch. The family lived in Alvechurch where their father owned the garage opposite the Red Lion.

June left school at 15 and went to art college. Later she worked in a Furriers where she would be given fur coats to redesign into new items of fur clothing. She was an accomplished needlewoman.

In 1950, when she was 22, June married John Border. As a wedding present June's father gave the couple a plot of land in Rowney Green. They lived in a caravan on the land while they built their house, Three Meadows, brick by brick. June loved her home and her garden. June and John went on to have three boys, Mark, Julian and Jonathan. In his 50's John was diagnosed with lung cancer, and June nursed him throughout his long illness. He died in 1988, aged 62. June was very proud of her sons but sadly each died before her. Jonathan died in 2010, then Julian in 2016, with Mark losing his battle against cancer in 2018. Julian was well known in the village where

the Incredible Edibles plot in the Square has been named after him.

June was a very caring person and her happiest job was working at the Lawns, she had a lovely tuneful voice and used to sing in St Laurence church choir, though eventually laid aside both of these interests to care for John.

Her funeral was planned as a joyful expression of her Christian faith. It was led by Sue Phillips Wardle with St Laurence choir leading the congregation singing *"Morning has broken"*, *"How great thou art"* and *"Thine be the glory, risen conquering son"*.

Tributes to a much-loved aunt, friend and neighbour were given by her niece Melissa Noton, her friend and boss from The Lawns, Veronica Rogers, on behalf of St Laurence choir by Elizabeth Richmond and her neighbours Jacqui Grandfield and Mike Brendan-Penn.

Her body was laid to rest in the churchyard alongside John, her late husband.

Doreen was born in Oldbury on 3rd December 1937 and was the second youngest of six children - her brother Fred and sisters Betty, Barbara, Joan and Janet. The family were close-knit and a lifelong bond was forged between Doreen and her sisters.

Doreen's first job was as a shop assistant at the local post office and tobacconist shop, whilst still at school. She left school aged 15 and went to work at Lawrence's Haberdashery Shop in Warley.

Within 5 years another 3 shops were added to the business. When these businesses were eventually sold Doreen went to work in a Tobacconists as a manageress and trouble-shooter.

Over the years Doreen was fortunate to have had the opportunity to travel – from early trips to Spain, Majorca and Cyprus, to cruises to the Azores, Canaries and the Caribbean and trips to parts of China, Thailand, South Africa, America and to The Cayman Islands.

Doreen had lived in the parish for 37 years, having moved to Ash Lane Hopwood in 1982 and was very outgoing and sociable, taking genuine pleasure in the company of her wide circle of friends and family – she played Bingo weekly, read, listened to a wide variety of music, played cards and loved regular trips to the theatre. However, her favourite hobby was gardening, and she took great pride in the many beautiful flowers she grew and spent many happy hours pottering around in the garden.
