Rev Richard Bubbers Writes...

Why forgive?

Eva Kor recently hit the headlines: she is the 81-year-old Auschwitz survivor who gave evidence in the trial of 93-year-old Oscar Gröning – he was the SS guard who took and recorded the money of Jewish prisoners as they arrived at the death camp. Not only did she lose the rest of her family in the Nazi gas chambers, but she and her twin sister were subject to Joseph Mengele's terrible medical experiments – she came near to death herself, and her sister never recovered from the experience.

When Eva had finished giving evidence against Gröning, she went over to where he was sitting and shook hands with him. He responded by pulling her towards him and kissing her. She said that she had spoken out at the trial to give a voice to the victims and to help the world never to forget what had happened. But she also said – and this was the surprise – that she had **forgiven** the Nazis. She has received much criticism for saying this, as some say that forgiveness can only be given where there is genuine repentance.

Was this a sign of weakness, giving the impression that justice does not matter? That is not what Eva Kor was saying - and given the suffering she has been through, she deserves to have her reasons heard. She makes it clear that she did it, not for the Nazis, but for herself – it was what was best for **her**. She even describes forgiveness as the most formidable form of revenge. Forgiving those responsible for Auschwitz meant that they lost the power they once had over her life. Her forgiving Gröning neither stopped her from testifying against him, nor prevented him from taking responsibility for his own actions. So

repentance and justice are involved, but they are not a condition of forgiveness but a response to forgiveness.

We should also notice the astonishing result of her forgiveness: she found the strength to live freely again - she was no longer defined by the horrors of her past, despite the unimaginable experiences she suffered. A trauma may render us powerless for a while, but there will come a time when we have the choice to take back our lives, and become the subject of our own story rather than its object.

Forgiveness is not just about what it can do for others: it is about the good that it can do to us. Archbishop Desmond Tutu, who worked tirelessly for justice in South Africa, said that, *"to forgive is not just to be altruistic. It is the best form of self-interest.....you can come out the other side a better person. A better person than the one being consumed by anger and hatred.... You can move on, and you can even help the perpetrator to become a better person too."*

To make my decision to forgive dependent on someone else's decision about whether to express remorse, is to disempower me and deny me the opportunity to receive healing and restoration. The Christian faith teaches that God's offer of forgiveness is prior to my expression of remorse or repentance: in the parable of the Prodigal Son the father runs to meet his son, before the son has even said a word. Indeed the grace and mercy shown in that offer of forgiveness, was most costly, since it came through the death and resurrection of God's own Son, Jesus Christ; and that is what inspires me to turn my life around and repent, and seek God's help in showing mercy and forgiveness to others.

The words above the entrance to Auschwitz said "work makes you free": they could be changed to *"forgiveness makes you free."*

Don't miss our next meeting, on Monday 1st June 2015. We will be welcoming David Clark, whose talk has a local history aspect to it. David will tell us about eight Worcestershire women transported to Australia in 1787, in a fascinating talk called *"Sentenced to Beyond the Seas"*.

This follows our May meeting which was also concerned with crime & punishment, but from half a century later. We heard about the Andover Workhouse Scandal in the 1840s; a tale of political intrigue, press accusations and an extraordinarily expensive Select Committee. Workhouses were intended to support the poor and infirm, so when inmates were set to the task of crushing bones from the slaughterhouse for agricultural bonemeal, an almighty row ensued.

Letter from the Archdeacon of Worcester



A Christian presence in every community

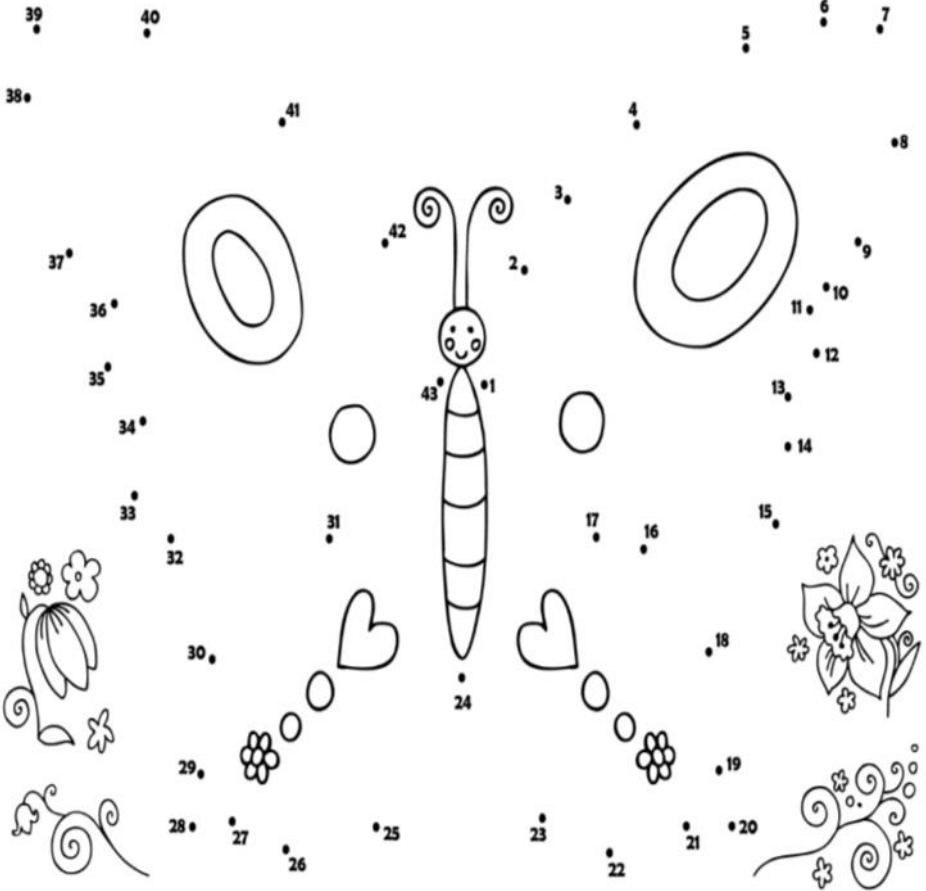
There seems to have been a lot of news lately, if you know what I mean. We've had a whole load of electioneering and politics, in the midst of which it's sometimes difficult to remember that politics is a noble calling. We've seen the most abject suffering brought about by natural disaster in Nepal, as well as the disturbing scenes of migrants, men and women like you and me, desperately seeking refuge in Italy. Mass migration across the Middle East is a daily reality for many, but it easily drops off our news agenda. In the thick of the immigration debate Cardinal Vincent Nichols rightly reminded us not to forget that we are talking about actual people. It's very easy to become de-sensitized to news when we see the same images every day and no longer take it in. We may even lose hold of our own values.

We're talking about Christian values – sending people to be part of relief missions across the world; inspiring men and women to stand for Parliament or local council; and standing up for nothing less than the image and likeness of God in each and every human person. Although it might sometimes seem that all the action is elsewhere, when it comes to nurturing Christian values, the action is right under our noses where we are. Because the bold claim made about our Church is this: we are a Christian presence in every community.

That's what it says on the Church of England website and a Christian presence in every community is what I've been experiencing in my first few months as archdeacon, not least during the month of May, when archdeacons meet the churchwardens from all the churches across the Diocese. It has been a humbling experience to hear stories of commitment and hard work, new ideas and well-tried events. It struck me that the visible Christian presence is no longer the vicar, but the people of God going about their Christian business.

To be the Christian presence in every community relies on living stones, like you and me, playing our part and living out our Christian values. Our churches are communities which nurture those values, places which encourage us all to live out God's call and his hand on our own lives, whether it makes the news or not. In our diocese we've been calling these living stones Kingdom People, a reminder of the teaching at the heart of Jesus' message and the heart of the prayer he gave us: '*your kingdom come, here on earth as in heaven*'. I wonder what that kingdom might look like on the news.

Ron Barnett's War at Sea

Some years ago, while staying with Dad's sister outside Truro, Dad and I had a ride out to Falmouth. We walked up a road that climbed a hill alongside the docks / shipyards. Dad told me he had come to Falmouth in early 1940 to join his first ship. Near the top we sat on a bench overlooking the estuary. Suddenly Dad said, *"I came here after stowing my gear aboard ship and, as I sat here, I saw my ship disappearing off down the river. Thinking I was going to get thrown in the brig for being AWOL, I rushed back to the docks, only to be told, "Don't worry mate, she'll be back in an hour or so. She's just gone off for gunnery practice!"* Such was Dad's initiation into the Merchant Navy.

This first ship was the *Hartismere*. Built in 1933 by Gray and Co Ltd of West Hartlepool. She was a steamship of 5,498 tons and owned by J&C Harrison of London. When Dad joined her as a wireless operator, she had just returned from Montevideo on the river Plate and on board was a Capt Dove who, along with other Merchant officers, had been a prisoner on board the German pocket battleship Graf Spee during the battle of the River Plate. Capt Dove was the captain of the Africa Shell, a Shell tanker sunk in the Indian Ocean by gunfire from Graf Spee. *Hartismere* sailed for the USA and returned loaded with oil, (presumably in barrels, as she was not a tanker). They were bound for a French port but as they were getting near, the Nazis began overrunning France, so, in Dad's words, *"We swanned with us!"* The "powers that be" decided to send them all the way back to the States, which seems a total waste of time and fuel, at a time when we could use every drop we could get our hands on! Eventually the *Hartismere* returned to the UK and Dad was "paid off".

When a ship's crew were paid off, they joined "The Pool". This was the seamen not allocated to a ship and they were then assigned to a ship that needed their rank, be it officer or seaman, radio operator or stoker. This was how Dad joined his second ship, the Shell tanker *Cardita*.

She was built in 1931 and was 8,237 tons. At the outbreak of war she was fitted with a 4 inch calibre gun on the stern and other smaller guns. The 4 inch gun, at least, was operated by a Royal Naval Reserve gunner. His name was Bill. I think his surname may have been Johnson, but Dad usually referred to him as Bill.

After the war, in 1946, Bill carried me into St Laurence's in Alvechurch for my christening by the late Rev. Underhill! (Which, incidentally, is why the Barnetts became associated with St Bart's when Rev Underhill became vicar in 1952). I don't know the exact date that Dad joined *Cardita*, but in September of 1940 he celebrated his 21st on board, about three days out from New York! Dad had a few tales about his time with the *Cardita*, but I think I will leave those for part two!

Ron and Margaret Barnett (his parents) spent the first year or so of their marriage lodging with a Win Allwood, wife of the then local butcher, Len, (who was in the army) until they bought their first house in Snake Lane, where Robert spent the first 2 ½ years of his life.

Computer Lessons

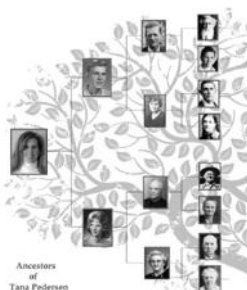

Obituary

Denis Cottam

Denis William Cottam was born on 22nd January 1924 in Birmingham in what are now known as the Back to Backs. He died very peacefully in what was his final home, The Lawns on 21st April 2015, aged 91. His funeral took place at Redditch crematorium on Thursday 7th May.

Denis didn't really enjoy his school days, what he did enjoy as a lad was riding on the back of his Dad's bike to the allotment in Selly Park, and building bikes from spare parts. At the age of 14 he left school and joined a company called Midland Gauge and Tool as an apprentice toolmaker. He enjoyed the job very much and developed a skill for precision tool making that never left him, indeed he eventually became Foreman in charge of 15 skilled tool makers. During the war years, Denis was regularly dispatched to Longbridge to assist in mending damaged fighter planes which had been flown or taken there for repair. In 1945 he married Betty who remained the love of his life, and

when she sadly died in October 2011, they had been married for 66 years, though the marriage did not get off to the best of starts, because on the actual day of the wedding Denis was called up for national service and joined the RAF, where he served as a driver.

After the war cycling continued to play a big part in their lives, they would cycle for miles on a tandem. Dennis even built a sidecar so their daughters could go along for the ride. Betty and Denis had three children, Denise, Jennifer and Elizabeth. Just after Elizabeth was born they moved to West Heath where they were very active in church life, Dennis was a warden, a sidesman, and together they ran festivals, fetes, and dances for the local teenagers. Their final move was to Alvechurch where they made their family home in Hinton Avenue.

Denis and Betty absolutely loved modern sequence dancing. They were exceptional dancers and enjoyed nothing more than finding dance venues whilst on holiday where they could continue their pastime. He will be greatly missed by the whole family, children, grandchildren and great grandchildren.
