the idea that God wished to be with us. The word in my heading above, Immanuel, is to be found in the prophecies of Isaiah. He talks of a desert of the sort I have described, and makes of it a metaphorical image of a highway being built across such a desert along which God could come to reign among his people, and of a voice being heard shouting from that desert inviting people to welcome their King.

Immanuel - God with us.

A story that begins in: THE DESERT.

Christmas is celebrated one way or another by most people living in this country. But what do they celebrate, and how do they do it?

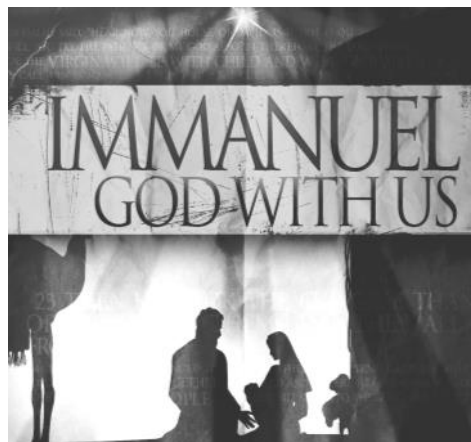
For so many people Christmas both begins and ends in a desert. The word desert implies desertion, but what, or who, has been deserted? Sadly the answer lies in the name 'Christmas' itself. It is God himself, and his willingness, indeed his greatest desire, to 'be with us' that has been deserted and denied by increasing numbers of people. So many who do this are even now wrapping up gifts for their children, their families, their friends, forgetful of the 'gift' that started it all. Even the most common gift of all that is sent out at Christmas time, the Christmas Card, seems rarely these days to want to remind us of the baby that was born, during a necessity of migration, by a mother forced to give birth in a cow-shed and lay her infant in a feeding trough. And our over-eating and over-drinking does not help to bring this to mind either.

Most of us feel the need to 'prepare' for Christmas. As soon as the summer holidays are over the shops from which Christmas gifts are purchased do not hesitate to remind us of this. The Hebrew people, among whom the ideas materialised of the sort of God Christians today believe in, also gave birth to

In the New Testament of the Bible we read of John the Baptist saying, *"that voice you read about in Isaiah is mine. Prepare for that King by coming here and repenting of your desertion of God."* And thousands did!

When you read this, it will be in the period of 'preparation for Immanuel' in which we are encouraged to recognise our corporate desert lives. This period is called ADVENT.

Letter From Nikki Archdeacon of Dudley - *Christmas Unwrapped*

The rituals of gift giving associated with Christmas come from a multitude of sources, some mythological, some religious, many commercial. The Bible tells us that wise men from the East brought gifts for Jesus, and we celebrate Christmas with much exchanging of presents. But how many of us take time to see beyond this ritualistic giving and reflect on the real meaning of Christmas; to 'unwrap' Christmas so we can see what it's really about. We're always very keen to get the wrapping off our gifts quickly and not just admire the packaging, but are we prepared to do the same to the heart of Christmas, to see beyond the ribbons and bows to the truth of the underlying message?

That very first Christmas, only some people could see beyond the wrapping, or were prepared to look. Most were deceived by outward appearances. God's people were awaiting the gift of a Saviour, the Messiah who would come announcing a new age, heralding the start of God's kingdom on earth, setting them free from oppression and captivity, bringing peace. They had expectations of what this Messiah would be like - a king, a mighty warrior. They were expecting a governing prince, the Son of the most high God. That kind of Saviour would surely arrive with a flourish, a fan fare, making a massive impact.

But Jesus came effectively in disguise, a refugee born to a teenage mum in a borrowed stable. So most people missed him, missed the significance of his birth, and the life which was beginning. People failed to see beyond outward appearances then, just as they do now. Some shepherds though, simple folk out in the fields, were surprised by angels. Angels who told them that the Saviour had been born, not in a palace, where shepherds like them would never get a security pass, but in a stable; not wrapped in the finest of regal garments, but wrapped in strips of cloth. They declared this child would bring peace to the world. And the shepherds took these angels at their word. They went and found the baby, lying in a manger. They saw beyond the strips of cloth and the impoverished surroundings. They had eyes to see who this baby was to become, and with joy and confidence they went out to spread the good news of his birth. News of peace and joy.

We too can be surprised if we take time to unwrap Christmas; to seek God now as wise men and simple shepherds sought him long ago; to explore the real message of Christmas, which is most certainly more than the clamour of commercials to spend, spend, spend and the ringing of cash tills in our ears. At Christmas time we receive so many presents we don't really need, while God offers us a gift we cannot do without - the gift of peace, and relationship with him. I pray you may receive and unwrap the gift of life this Christmas.

Patient Online Access for patients aged 16 years and over

You can now go online at any time to:

- * Book and cancel appointments
- * Order current repeat prescription items
- * View a summary of your medical record

The service is available 24/7. All you need is access to a computer which will help when you cannot get through to the surgery to book or cancel appointments. You will need to register with the surgery receptionist who will explain the procedure to you.

Shingles Vaccinations

This is now available to certain people in their 70s. You can still have the vaccine even if you have already had shingles. It's given as a single injection for people who meet the following criteria:

Aged 70: dob between 2.9.1943 and 1.9.1944

Aged 78: dob between 2.9.1935 and 1.9.1936

Aged 79: dob between 2.9.1934 and 1.9.1935

You will only need to have the vaccination once and you can have it at any time of the year.

Graham Clark writes...

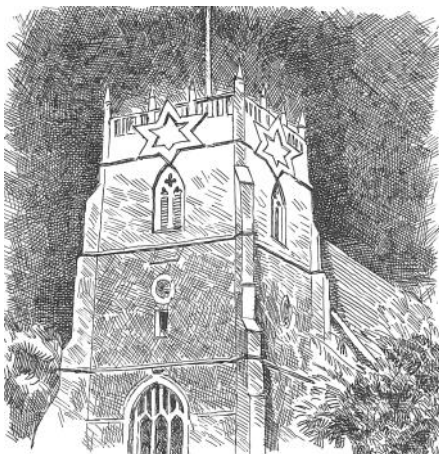
Two thousand years ago a star attracted the attention of a group of Eastern mystics and caused them to follow its progress across the sky to Bethlehem. Their beliefs told them that this was a portent of a royal birth. (Before anyone comments – despite various translations of the earliest Greek text, we don't know that there were three of them and we don't know that they were kings. We just know that they came from the east and brought three gifts).

In Bethlehem they looked in the king's palace, the obvious place to find a royal child. But the child they sought was born in much humbler circumstances. They eventually found him, presented their gifts and worshiped him.

And ever since the star has been an abiding symbol of Christmas.

For the first Christmas of the new millennium stars were erected on the top of the tower at St Laurence church. 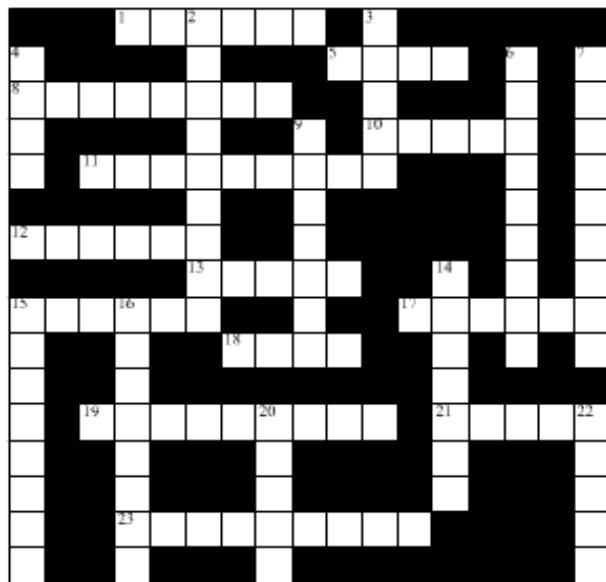

St Laurence Churchyard

Christmas isn't too far away and the churchyard year is fading fast....so time for an "end-of-term" report. 2014 brought us a wettish Spring followed by a dry, warm Summer ...good conditions for keeping the churchyard looking reasonably tidy....well, that's the theory !

The reality was that the churchyard equipment store suffered two burglaries in June and July. Although our mowers weren't stolen, most of the portable hand tools (strimmers, hedge cutters etc) were, which stopped us strimming for many weeks. The areas around trees and older headstones and our strewing area looked rather neglected at times and we're sorry that this annoyed one or two visitors. Both burglaries involved parts of the store roof being ripped off and after the first of these had been repaired, we decided on a radical solution. Some of you may have noticed the large grey shipping container which arrived in September, complete with extra security. All our replacement equipment has now been moved into the container and treated with SmartWater, a forensic chemical "fingerprint", invisible to humans, but favoured by the Police for linking criminals to stolen goods. We've sited the container as discreetly as possible but have kept the original store for hand tools, rock salt etc.

The burglary saga made maintenance work a lot harder as most tools had to be stored off-site until the container arrived. So it's a special thank you to all our volunteers for coping with that and still managing to keep the grass and churchyard edges looking reasonably good. I must also thank some new volunteers who've joined the team this yearBarry and Lizzie Lunn have done sterling work with the mowers and strimmers, Laurie Baldwin has been weeding around the church itself and Mark and

Gillian Shepherd have been tackling saplings on graves and removing grass from churchyard paths....all valuable tasks. Seasoned regulars Basil Booth, Irene Hoare and Clive Stevens have done their usual great job too.

Churchyard blossom and flowers were again a delight in the Spring and early Summer and to commemorate the Great War centenary, poppies were planted near to the porch and were still flowering into early November.

The winter months will see the volunteers doing their usual pruning and cutting back, with the occasional bonfire to get rid of the vast quantity of material involved. We hope you'll understand that a few fires are necessary and hope they don't cause too many issues for near-neighbours to the church.

Finally...the vast majority of our visitors treat the churchyard with respect and we're grateful for that. Can we politely ask dog walkers to keep their dogs on leads and bag-up their faeces.... and ask all visitors to leave wreaths, floral tributes and plastic bags etc in the bins provided rather than outside them, where animals can rip them open. We empty those bins twice a week but if they are full, please help us by taking the rubbish to the large yellow wheelie bin in the turning circle near The Lawns. As in previous years, we will leave Christmas wreaths on graves until the end of February, but then clear them as they will have died by then. If you wish to re-use a wreath, please remove it before then.

Obituaries

Dr Sybil James

A Memorial Service for the distinguished scientist Dr. Sybil James, née Luckett, was held in the Church on Wednesday 5th November.

The Reverend Ian Firmstone conducted the service. Her daughter Ann and son Stephen and her colleague, Dr. Rosemary Waring paid tributes. The service began and ended with music by Handel, and the congregation of former colleagues, students, family and friends, joined in her favourite hymns.

Sybil James died at The Lawns, on 25 October. Four years earlier she had left her home in Selly Oak, Birmingham, and returned to the village where she grew up. Born in Harborne in 1917, she came to Alvechurch as a young child, living first in rooms over the old Co-op premises before moving to one of the Matthews' houses in Old Rectory Lane.

She attended the village school and the Baptist Church Sunday school. She loved to wander in the fields and along the hedgerows. She found spotted orchids and a skylark's nest. She had piano lessons with Miss Newbold, and Mrs. Edmonds from the school taught her about butterflies and encouraged her life-long love of botany.

At the age of nine she won a Scholarship to the County High School where she continued to prove herself an outstanding student, as well as being head girl and captain of the hockey XI. She excelled in the School Certificate examinations, and won one of only 80 nation-wide State Scholarships. This enabled her to go in 1934, with the encouragement of her parents, to Birmingham University to study Chemistry and Botany.

As an undergraduate she continued to excel, winning the Frankland Prize for the best Chemistry student in her year. Supported by a State Studentship, she went on to write a Ph. D. The Professor of Chemistry (Sir Walter Norman Haworth who won the Nobel Prize in 1937 for his work on the constitution of Vitamin C) thought highly of her, and took her on to the staff. She was to continue to work there, in evolving fields of research, moving to Biochemistry, and in the 1970's setting up a new course in Toxicology. Devoted to scientific research, meticulous and clear thinking, she worked at the highest standards. Equally she took great pains with her teaching and with getting the best from her Ph D students. They speak of her great kindness and support. Always highly regarded by colleagues in universities and in industry, she was awarded the prestigious degree on Doctor of Science in 1960.

She married Eric W. James of The Bridges, Alvechurch in the Baptist Chapel in 1939 and they moved to a flat in Edgbaston. but the bombing saw them taking refuge in Old Rectory Lane. Later Sybil continued to visit Alvechurch to see her parents until 1972 when her mother, Clare, became ill and had to leave to live with her daughter Barbara.

Sybil is survived by three children, eight grand children and two great-grand children both born after Eric died in 2000. All of them, in England and Australia, will remember with love and admiration a woman who was ahead of her time.
